At Bellerive, we prepare students academically, spiritually, morally, socially, and culturally so they may contribute meaningfully to society and the Common Good. Our mission, grounded in the example of Jesus and inspired by Marie Madeleine d’Houët, guides us in creating a community where all are welcomed, valued, and empowered.

How We Promote British Values

Our FCJ identity is the foundation for our work. British Values are promoted through:

1. Religious Education

Key Stage 3 – Identity, belonging, Judaism, Sikhism, moral responsibility.

Key Stage 4 – Community cohesion, interfaith dialogue, ethics, Catholic social teaching.

Sixth Form – Ethical debate, crime and punishment, world religions, life after death.

2. PSHE

Fortnightly lessons across Years 7-13 along with X3 curriculum drop down days explore governance, identity, diversity, equality, extremism, environmental awareness, online safety, and responsible choices.

3. Wider Curriculum

Other subjects promote debate, critical thinking, cooperation, and cultural literacy, for example, study of democratic processes in History and Geography, Debates and critical thinking in English, ethical discussions in science, respect for cultural contributions in Art, Music and MFL

4. School Life

- Student leadership opportunities include School council, Form Captains, Sports Leaders, Chaplaincy Leaders, Eco and Charity Teams, and Peer Mentors.
- Assemblies and liturgies emphasising dignity, justice and respect
- Charity and social action, including CAFOD, Foodbanks and FCJ international missions


We believe the teaching of British Values should:

- Enable students to distinguish right from wrong and to respect the civil and criminal law of England.
- Encourage students to accept responsibility for their behaviour, show initiative, and to understand how they can contribute positively to the lives of those living and working in the locality of the school and to society more widely.
- Enable students to acquire a broad general knowledge of and respect for public institutions and services in England.
- Enable students to learn and have the knowledge of how to positively embrace and celebrate diversity and equality.
- Encourage respect for other people.
- Encourage respect for democracy and support for participation in the democratic processes, including respect for the basis on which the law is made
